



# **GaPSC Updates**

**GACTE - October 25-27, 2023** 

- Implementation of Foundations of Reading, Literacy, and Language (Rule 505-3-.03) is underway. GaPSC staff are reviewing your Readiness Assessments and Action Plans and plan to provide you with reflective, formative feedback by December 8, 2023. For more information, see the Implementation Guide.
- Amendments are proposed for the Educator Preparation Rules listed below. Details of these and other
  proposed Certification and Ethics rules are available on the GaPSC Rules webpage. In addition, a new
  Educator Preparation rule is proposed, 505-3-.70, Speech-Language Associate Program, to prepare
  individuals at the baccalaureate degree level to support certified Speech-Language Pathologists. The
  public comment period for the proposed amendments and the new rule closes November 24, 2023.
  - 505-3-.01, Requirements and Standards for Approving Educator Preparation Providers and Educator Preparation Programs
  - 505-3-.02, Educator Preparation Provider Annual Reporting and Evaluation
  - 505-3-.63, Curriculum and Instruction
  - 505-3-.71, Speech and Language Pathology
  - 505-3-.72, Teacher Leadership
- 505-3-.92, K-5 Mathematics Endorsement
- 505-3-.104, Teacher Leader Endorsement
- Please remind your candidates and P-12 partners to utilize the <u>GaPSC Certificate Upgrade Advisor</u> prior to enrolling in an advanced degree program for a certificate level upgrade.
- If you offer **Curriculum and Instruction**, please consider adding a certification-only option. As the Conversion Mechanism is no longer available, educators who complete out-of-state programs that do not result in certification will be required to complete a certification-only program to add the field and earn an upgrade. Contact your GaPSC Education Specialist for more information.
- Candidates completing clinical practice in a Georgia school must hold a Pre-Service Certificate before
  beginning field and clinical experiences, unless they hold a valid Professional, Induction, Provisional,
  Permit, or Waiver certificate. A candidate that is employed as a teacher of record while holding only a
  Clearance Certificate must also hold a Pre-Service Certificate, otherwise their clinical practice may not be
  accepted for certification. Updated guidance is in development.
- GaPSC's support of transitioning military veterans and their spouses continues with staff specifically devoted to recruiting, counseling, and supporting these individuals, working with five of Georgia's seven military bases. Opportunities for in-person recruitment briefings at bases are increasing this year.
- The 2023-24 Georgia Code of Ethics for Educators (COE) presentation, available under *Presentations* on the <u>Ethics Resources webpage</u>, includes common violations, scenarios, and takeaways for each of the ten COE standards. It is designed so that school districts, EPPs, and others can customize the presentation to meet their needs.
- Please remind pre-service candidates and in-service educators to carefully answer the Personal
  Affirmation Questions (PAQs) to ensure accuracy each academic year. A new and growing GaPSC Video
  Series is available to help educators answer PAQs, navigate MyPSC, and more.

Math and literacy teachers explore intersection of mathematics and literary art. Inversion, arcs, focus, and lines are literary analytical tools with roots in mathematics, yet traditional disciplinary silos—and the disciplinary identities that accompany them—hardly allow for "cross-talk" between literary art and the language of quantitative reasoning. This paper demonstrates disruptive potential for transdisciplinary learning that recasts literary analysis and mathematics concept development as creative problem-solving practices.
