#### Session A: The Visual in Information Literacy: How Visual Literacy Enhances Information Literacy

Dr. Kiawana Kennedy, Georgia Public Broadcasting

The expansion of literacy and its impact on student learning has brought communication across multiple areas in today's classrooms. #### **GaPSC 2024-2025 Teacher Recruitment Initiative**


#### **Executive Summary**

SB88, passed in the 2021 legislative session, signed by Governor Kemp addresses the recruitment of teachers particularly teachers of color, so that the Georgia teacher workforce can more closely resemble Georgia's student population. Toward the vision of developing a teacher workforce that more closely resembles Georgia students, the GaPSC 2024-2025 Teacher Recruitment Planning Committee determined that there is a need for a cohesive, state-wide plan to guide and support efforts to recruit more educators of color, and that elevating the perception of the teaching profession is a vitally important first step. The planning committee will devise and implement a multi-pronged strategic plan involving multiple stakeholders focused on statewide teacher recruitment.

#### **Planned Outcomes**

- Identifying the reasons why persons of color are not choosing to enter the profession by hosting focus groups of teacher personas.
- Identifying the root causes of teacher burnout by having stakeholders read the 2022 GaDOE Burnout Report.
- Developing a preliminary plan for an *Elevating* the *Teaching Profession* campaign by identifying
   the audiences that should be targeted, as well as
   potential production and media partners that
   might agree to support the work at low-cost.
- Developing statewide awareness of the economic impacts of HBCUs, and their historical foundation of preparing teachers.
- Scaffolding out a year-long focus on teacher recruitment of teachers of color by hosting Roundtable Tour stops statewide in an effort to build statewide awareness, and collect qualitative data related to teacher recruitment and retention.
